

The Fifth, Expanded Edition of the Latin Text, the First Printed in Italy, and the First Time "De Facile Acquisibilibus" is Added

1. [H]ORCUS SANICACIS. [Venice: Bernardinus Benalius & Johannes de Cridino alias Cacuinus, 1511].

The fifth, expanded edition of the Latin text and the first edition printed in Italy. The tract De facile acquisibilibus is added for the first time as a supplement to the section De urinis. Folio (11 $^{7/8}$ x 8 $^{1/8}$ inches; 300 x 205 mm). With 367 (of 368) leaves, bound without the final blank which is common. Printed in double columns, with over 1000 columnwidth woodcuts within the text. Title page within an elaborate woodcut border and three full-page woodcuts. Two of which are of physicians, and the third is of a skeleton. The illustration cuts are reverse copies of those by Johann Prüss. from the c.1496 Strasbourg which were copies from the first edition printed in Mainz by Jacob Meydenbach in 1491.

Newer full calf. Boards stamped in black and blind. Spine lettered in gilt and incorrectly dated 1497. Title-page is slightly remargined from the top and bottom. A few leaves with some very minor worming, all to the edge of the bottom margin, not affecting text. Some light spotting to a few leaves. Overall a beautiful and clean copy.

In reference to an earlier edition "The full-page woodcut of the human skeleton appears here for the first time in an edition of the Herbals, and was added to nearly all the following Latin, French, and also to some German editions of the Hortus up to about 1540. 



First complete edition of Appian's Roman history (*De bellis civilibus* had been printed by Vindelinus de Spira in 1472). Two parts in one volume. Large quarto (11 ^{1/4} x 8 ^{1/8} inches; 286 x 206 mm.). [131] (of [132], lacks initial blank); [212] leaves. Roman type, thirty-two lines, printed marginalia. Two full-page white-vine woodcut title borders (the first use of each border), five- and nine-line white-on-black woodcut initials, all handcolored in this copy. Ruled in red throughout, headlines supplied in red, some paragraph marks supplied in red and blue. Early ink pagination in lower margin. The lower part of c1 verso and all of c2 recto have been left blank intentionally, to correspond with a lacuna of one folio in Appian's manuscript, with a printed marginal note to that effect.

Full contemporary vellum. Spine with ink manuscript title. Inner hinge cracked. Bottom of spine with some chipping. Some occasional worming, generally to margins and usually not affecting text. Worming slightly affecting a few folding plates and endpapers with more worming. Some toning throughout, mainly to folding plates. Contemporary ink notes to front pastedowns and on a few leaves. 

Second edition in English, the first obtainable English edition. (No complete copy of the first edition has been at auction in the past 75 years. One incomplete copy was at auction on 1975). Folio in sixes ($10^{-1/2} \times 7^{-1/4}$ inches; 270 x 185 mm). [12], 259, [3], [42, Mirrour], [24, Egloges] leaves. Present copy collated the same as Pforzheimer. Printed in black letter. With 116 woodcuts in the text and a woodcut on the title-page. "There are 116 woodcuts in the text of which 8 are repeated twice and 1 once. These illustrations are from the blocks cut for Pynson's edition, 1509 and, with the exception of two or three are very well preserved." (Pforzheimer 41). Of the falshode of Antichrift.

"In the present edition the Balade of our Lady which concluded the 1509 edition is omitted, while the verses excusing rudeness of the translation are transposed from

beginning to end. "(Pfozheimer, 41). After the text of Ship of Fooles, this edition contains signatures A1-G6 The Mirrour of Good Maners and signatures A1-D6 the Egloges of Alexander Barclay. "The present is of considerable interest and value because of the Eglogues appended, the original editions of which are exceedingly rare." (Pforzheimer, 41).



Chis is the copy dedicated to King Louis XIII and specially bound for him in full vellum entirely covered with gilt stamped fleurs-de-lys on both covers, with a gilt heart within a larger central fleur-de-lys, triple fillet gilt borders, gilt floral corner ornaments, and fleurs-de-lys on spine. This copy entirely "fleur-de-lysée." Housed in a custom brown calf clamshell, stamped with fleurs-de-lys on front and back, gilt-stamped on spine. Of these special bindings, only very few are known, and were released from the library because they were duplicates; sometimes books were offered to and bound for not only the King but also the Queen. We know of two other books in similar bindings: a copy of Grotius in the University Library in Amsterdam and a copy of Montchrétien's Craitté de l'économie politique in the Waseda University Library in Tokyo, Bourgeois & André 2127. 

Contemporary mottled calf. Spine decoratively gilt, edges stained red. Top joint cracked, but cords strong, some spine restoration and old leather repairs to edges. Old ink signature on [A2], former owner's color penciled initials on front free endpaper. Occasional soiling and light marginal dampstains, few repairs in gutters. Overall, a very good copy, with magnificent broad

margins. This is much rarer than his De Aetna (1495), Gli Asolani (1505) or Prose (1525). Housed in a quarter morocco clamshell case.





With an early discussion of each of the "Ten Commandments." There are only two copies in OCLC, and we could find no copies at auction in the past 50 years.

Contemporary calf, rebacked. Boards ruled in gilt. Spine with newer morocco spine label, lettered in gilt. Spine decoratively stamped in gilt. Gilt board edges. All edges red. Inner hinges repaired. Small mark where bookplate has been removed to front free endpaper. Some repairs to inner margin of titlepage. A 2.5×1 inch tear to the outer margin of leaf Z2, only affecting a few letters. Final leaf (the table) with some major repairs, with loss to a few words. Some dampstaining and toning throughout. Previous owner's old ink marginalia throughout. Front free endpaper with the notation that it was bought at the sale of the principal $\{?\}$ library. Old ex-library stamps on leaf A2 (dedication) and Nn (last leaf). Overall a very good copy. Bound in 19th-century brown calf. Boards and spine ruled and stamped in blind. Spine with red morocco spine label, lettered in gilt. Board edges and dentelles stamped in blind. All edges red. Marbled endpapers. Boards slightly rubbed. Four previous owner's bookplates on front pastedown. Front free endpaper with old ink notations (quotation from Saint Augustine) and small purple library stamp from the "Society of Jesus" in Milltown Park Ireland. The "Society of Jesus" is the Catholic group of which its members are the Jesuits. Title-page with cropped early annotation at top margin, and same small "Society of Jesus" library stamp to lower corner. Some dampstaining and toning, particularly to beginning. 
First Edition. One of two issues of the same year, priority unknown. Our year based upon the issue points as shown by the British Library: "with The "A" of signature mark "A4" under the "t" of "the" "ESTC S125409. Quarto (9 1/4 x 7 1/4 inches; 236 x 185 mm). [92 leaves]. A8-L8, M4. With preface signed "Chine in the Lord, Robart F. Herrey" and dated "xxii of December. An. Domini. 1578." We could find no other complete copies of this first edition of "Concordance" at auction in the past 50 years.

Although this comes separately, The Herrey "Concordance" is generally found issued with a Barker Geneva Bible starting with the date 1580. There were several printings of this "Concordance" starting in 1580 and going into the next decade, however only the present copy and one other printing were issued with the two versions of the Barker Bibles of 1580. Present copy with Signatures: A-L8 M4 and with The "A" of signature mark "A4" under the "t" of "the". This version was issued with the 1580 Bible, Darlow & Moule 123. Another version of the same year with Signatures: A-C4 D-V8 was issued with the 1580 Bible Darlow & Moule 124.

Bound separately in modern full brown morocco. Covers ruled in triple blind and with a central "Cross" devise in blind on both covers. Newer endpapers. Some occasional ink small hand marginalia. Edges of leaves a bit frayed. A stain to bottom margin of leaves H2-H3. A paper repair to bottom margin of final leaf, M4 not affecting text. Overall very good. Darlow & Moule 123. ESCC \$125409 . Extremely rare 1510 illustrated edition (probably a unique example) of Le Fevre's famous Croy Book, first printed by Caxton at Bruges about 1473-4, that being both Caxton's first book and the first book printed in the English language. Caxton's second book was the same work printed at Bruges in French, which may be the first work of French literature ever printed, and one of the first of any texts in the French language. The first edition printed in France is reported as at Lyons in 1486. The second edition in France is reported as printed at Lyons in 1490, the woodcuts of which are also found in the present edition and that of the abridged reprint of 1544. One or the other of the 1486 or 1490 edition may be suppositious, as both are cited with the same day of the same month – an error that might have arisen from a misprint "six" for "dix" in Brunet (Supplement to Brunet 1, col. 814) and this being followed by Copinger in his Supplement to Hain. Brunet (111, col. 926) was unable to cite any copy of this book in any collection or catalogue. Baudrier also described this copy.

A popular, much-reprinted work, Tymme's little religious book was first published in 1605. This copy contains ink inscriptions, signatures, and marginal notations in at least five different hands: John Locke (dated 1669 on p. v), Ri. Yolland (undated), Emmanual Bayhind (undated), William Yoo (dated December 21, 1782 on p. 244), and Rietteel (dated N. York, 1819 on front free endpaper and title-page). We have been unable to locate any information on the later owners of the book.

While many of the annotations in the volume are by its later owners, pp. iv and v contain Locke's signatures and inscriptions, including a quotation in Greek. Numerous other pages (pp. 4, 6, 9, 66, 78, 80, 101, 118, 134, 139, 144, 146, 165, 228, 229, 232, 234, and 238) contain marginal notes (often





in Greek) in what appears to be the same handwriting. Locke may have noted in the margin of p. 96 the date he purchased the book, its cost, and a selected list of page numbers; though partially obliterated by a later owner, the note seems to read "166[?]...his book of Mr....[?] florins." On p. 176, there appears in the margin a figure which may perhaps be an early, crude version of Locke's paraph—the distinctive mark he used to authenticate his signature on legal documents, and occasionally to mark his books for an unknown purpose (see Harrison and Laslett, pp. 41-2). Locke may have marked the spine with a label or press-mark, but if so, this has been lost when the volume was rebacked.


