




First edition, regular paper issue. Inscribed by Adams on the front wrapper rather than the inserted slip in front of title-page, which is the usual. Rare in wrappers. Signed "Revd Mr Smith/ from/ J. Q. Adams" Octavo (9 x 5  $^{1/2}$  inches; 230 x 140 mm). [1]-94, [2, blank] pp.

Publisher's original tan printed wrappers. Some minor wrinkling and creasing to wrappers. Wrapper corners and first few leaves with small dogeared folds. Some minor light foxing. Housed in a red cloth chemise, with previous owner's armorial bookplate on inside of chemise. Overall a very good copy in the rare original wrappers.

It is commonly known that at the time of the original publication of this book, John Quincy Adams was out of town, so he inscribed to friends on slips of paper that were to be inserted. This fact that this copy is in the original wrappers with the inscription on the wrapper rather than inserted makes this unique and quite desirable.

#### A Unique Autograph Album from the New York Constitutional Convention of 1846



A very interesting one-of-a-kind autograph album. The autograph book is titled in manuscript ink on the second leaf, "In Convention to Revise the Constitution. September 21st, 1846." Octavo (8  $^{3/8}$  x 7  $^{5/8}$  inches; 210 x 195 mm). Album has 69 leaves. Of these, 41 leaves have autographs. Most autographs are on the recto and generally are 4 autographs to a page. The autograph is on one line and then the address or hometown of the signer is on a line below. With approximately 135 ink signatures signed to the album, and another 3 laid in on slips of paper.

Contemporary full straight-grain orange morocco, rebacked to style. Boards tooled in gilt, and with a gilt central panel. All edges gilt. Drab brown endpapers. All leaves very clean. Overall a very good copy of this unique and desirable item.

Chere are several noteworthy signatures in the book including Silas Wright, the governor of New York at the time, as well as that of Addison Gardiner, the Lieutenant governor of the the state.



Album is complete with 52 portraits including twenty photographs in 6  $^{1/2}$  x 4  $^{1/2}$  inch size, and thirty-two cartes-des-visites in 5  $^{1/4}$  x 2  $^{1/2}$  inch size. Contemporary full navy calf over padded boards. Rebacked to style. Front board elaborately stamped and tooled in gilt. Back board ruled in gilt. Each board with a piece of a brass clap, incomplete without the clasping mechanism. All edges gilt. Light blue textured endpapers. Front leaf decorated in a colored floral design. A small amount of dampstaining to the first album page, not affecting photos. A few photo holders have small tears, but all are holding very well. Overall a wonderful example of a great collection.

This album starts off with a large portrait of Queen Victoria circa 1880s. It also has photographs of numerous scientists including

Darwin, Pasteur, Von Liebig, Faraday, and C.H. Huxley. Statesmen including Lincoln, Bismark, Gladstone and Disreali. Other important photos include Florence Nightingale, actress Edna May, Cardinal Newman, and the Duke of Devonshire among others.

First edition in English. This title was first published in Latin in 1719, and was a synopsis of what the great minds of that time believed about each of the known diseases. We could only find one copy of the first English edition on Rare Book Hub, which was sold by Maggs in 1954.

Contemporary brown paneled calf. Boards ruled in blind. Spines numbered in gilt. Board edges tooled in gilt. Edges speckled red. Hinges are cracked but holding firm. 

An early account of the legal proceedings in the Amistad affair, (which led way to the Supreme Court case United States v. Schooner Amistad; 1841), printed within Niles' National Register published by William Ogden Niles, Fifth series No. 5-Vol. VII. Vol. LVII- Whole No. 1, 461. Published on Saturday, September 28, 1839. Quarto ( $12^{1/8} \times 8^{3/4}$  inches;  $307 \times 213$  mm). 16 pp. (Pages 65-80).

Additionally, directly preceding this is an article on the birth of photography. The article is entitled "The Daguerreotype" and is announcing the invention of the daguerreotype, which was discovered by M. Daguerre in France in 1839. This new process of photography made it simpler that previous processes, enabling photography to be more accessible to a broader group of people.









Full contemporary speckled paneled calf, rebacked to style. Spine stamped with gilt thistles. Brown leather spine label, lettered in gilt. Corners bumped and boards a bit rubbed. A repair to leaf P2 of Part 1, just touching page numbers and a few letters. A small repair to outer margin of leaf Ooo2, just touching printed border and one letter. Some occasional spotting and dust soiling. Previous owner has corrected a few of the mispaginiations with a pencil. Two previous owner's bookplates on front pastedown. Overall very good.

Beaumont and Fletcher is the third great folio collection of Elizabethan drama after Jonson's (1616) and Shakespeare's (1623).

Engraved initials throughout both works.




#### Original Sketch of Ludwig Bemelmans' Most Famous character, Madeline. Signed by the Artist



With engraved portrait of Walton by Lombart, extra engraved architectural title page by Wenceslas Hollar, the second title-page is printed in red and black. Two double-page engraved maps and three double-page engraved plates by Hollar. As well as a single plate of architectural plans. Woodcut illustrations in text, woodcut initials, and engraved portrait of Castell by William Fairthorne. Title-page for "Lexicon is also printed in red and black. Text is in parallel Latin, Greek, Hebrew, Samaritan (Pentateuch), Ethiopic (Job to Malachi and New Testament), Persian (Gospels) and Arabic texts, with Aramaic (Chaldaean) Targums in volume four. Leaves are ruled in red throughout. This is considered the "Loyal" version with the newer preface which has been revised to downplay the help given by Oliver Cromwell of waiving taxes on the paper used for the printing. Present copy contains a 2 leaf dedication to Charles 11 supplied in an early reprint which was not included in the first issue with the earlier version of the preface (Leaves A1 & A2 of volume 1).

Uniformly bound by John Mackenzie in nineteenth-century full purple morocco. Wide and elaborately stamped gilt borders. Boards stamped in blind with a strapwork design, and with central cartouche outlined in gilt. Spines in six compartments ruled in gilt, four lettered in gilt. Gilt board edges. Thick gilt dentelles. Purple watered silk doublures and with a morocco presentation label on front pastedown of each volume, lettered in gilt. All edges gilt. Silk pages markers, some still with gold tassels. Previous owner's small bookplate on back free endpaper of each volume. A few pages roughly opened at bottom. Some minor foxing and spotting to a few leaves. A few small tears, not affecting text. Upper corner of title-page of Lexicon and a few leaves following with some minor repairs, not affecting text. Overall a beautiful, near fine set.

Chis Bible "contains for the first time texts in Ethiopic and Persian, making this the most complete, as well as the last, of all the great polyglot editions. One of its most notable features is its contribution to biblical textual criticism. The New Cestament has variants from the recently rediscovered Codex Alexandrinus, and the sixth volume gives an apparatus criticus from fifteen other sources. Walton received, and rebuffed, significant criticism for this editorial decision." (Sotheby's)

### The 1561 Edition, First Issue of Chaucer's Works, Enhanced with the Pare Second Issue Caxton Woodcuts

Fifth edition, first issue of Chaucer's *Works*, the rare and important 1561 first Stowe edition, enhanced with the 22 wonderful Caxton woodcuts of the second issue of the Pilgrims in the Prologue. This copy is the first issue with the title-page with the large woodcut of Chaucer's arms, dated 1560, but with the second issue preliminary leaves (14 leaves before signature B) including the Prologue with 22 woodcuts from the blocks used by Caxton in his second edition of *Che Canterbury Cales* which were probably inserted from a second issue. There has been some debate as the the priority of the two issues, with and without the woodcuts.

The traditional view was that the illustrated issue without the shield title-page was printed first, and then the cuts omitted in the second issue when the blocks were worn out. More recent

studies have contested that the printer came into possession of the cuts belatedly, and the unillustrated issue appeared first (see David R. Carlson, "The Woodcut Illustrations in Early Printed Editions of Chaucer's Canterbury Tales", in Chaucer Illustrated: Five Hundred Years of the Canterbury Tales in Pictures, British Library, 2003). Carlson states "the most plausible explanation seems to be that the printer and publisher of the [Stowe] edition, came into possession of the woodcuts belatedly after most of the press work for the edition had been done. After obtaining the blocks, they ran up a new issue of the beginning of the book, incorporating a 'General Prologue' illustrated with woodcut. In all documented cases, the unillustrated [i.e. first] 'General Prologue' occurs with a title page showing the Chaucer arms, dated 1560 at the top of the shield. A different title-page, dated 1561, is found in copies incorporating the [woodcut] illustrated General Prologue." Therefore with the present copy containing the Chaucer arms title-page it can be considered the first issue, which was later enhanced with the inclusion of the second issue prologue with woodcuts being bound in.

With woodcut on first page of the Knight's Tale (the woodcut of the Knight is from the block used in the undated edition, circa 1550), divisional titles on  $\Delta 1$  ("The Caunterburie tales") and  $\Delta a1$  ("The Romaunt of the Rose") each within a broad woodcut border showing the genealogy of the Houses of York and Lancaster down to Henry VIII (McKerrow and Ferguson 75), and decorative, intricate, woodcut initials and tailpieces throughout. # The Earliest Public Newspaper Announcement of the Final Emancipation Proclamation

Che publication of Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation in the Boston Daily Courier, and one of, if not the first official public announcements of the Final Emancipation Proclamation once it was signed and in effect as of January 1, 1863. The Proclamation is featured at the top of the center column of page [3].

We could no other copies of this or any other January 2nd edition at auction and it is not mentioned in Eberstadt. Eberstadt's entry for the second edition of the "Final Proclamation" (Eberstadt 9) states "Second edition. Apparently the only separate newspaper edition of the final proclamation and the earliest non-official

edition. Printed on Friday evening, January 2, 1863, this Extra, in point of chronological sequence, was preceded only by the first official edition." Our present copy, although not a separate newspaper edition, was published in the Friday Morning edition of the


Courier, placing it's publication prior to Eberstadt 9.

According to Eberstadt "A number of newspapers did not issue on January 2nd because of the previous day's holiday, but most of those that did carried the final proclamation. Many of the others printed it on January 3rd." (pg. 17).

This manuscript is exciting because it is an close representation but still a draft of what was finally printed. In comparing the two documents, you can see that the published piece was trimmed down a bit from what Steinbeck wrote in this manuscript draft. Most of these are some what self-deprecating, which is interesting to watch him ultimately play down. Apart from punctuation changes, the parts of this manuscript that are not found in the final publication have been indicated by us below by being housed within brackets.


